



Self-Feedback Checklist

It is important that you check your work before you submit your final assignment. Below is a checklist that you can use to ensure that you have considered all the relevant points in your assignment. You can write any additional notes you may want to record in the notes section.

Assignment question	Have you addressed all the elements of the question? (see 'breaking down an assignment question' guide for guidance) Are all your paragraphs relevant to the question? Introduction Ass	sources? Have you included broad background information supported with literature on the topic?		
	Have you included the aim of the assignment? Is there a clear line of argument? Eg, your reasoning or point of view		
lu lu	Have you included the outline of the assignment? Is your introduction roughly 10% of your final word count?		

Main body

Do all your paragraphs begin with a clear topic sentence?	
(see 'structuring paragraphs' guide)	
Have you included relevant theories and research to support your argument?	
Have you conveyed your understanding of the relevant theories and knowledge?	
Do your paragraphs show discussion of the key issues and concepts?	
Have you included more than one suitable evidence per paragraph?	
Do your paragraphs convey your understanding of the issue/concepts discussed?	
Have you used cautious language when concluding in each paragraph and in	
your conclusion? (see using cautious language in your writing)	
Have you explored or elaborated on the evidence?	
Have you used a variety of sources to support your claim?	
Have you paraphrased or summarised the evidence?	
If you have used quotes, what is your rationale for it? (Tip: it is best to avoid	
quotes in your writing unless you can justify yourself)	
Do all your paragraphs flow?	
Have you provided your reasoning at the end of the paragraph?	
Have you used connecting words to show how your sentences are logically connected?	

Are you using the correct referencing scheme?		
Have you checked your reference list for mistakes with your punctuation marks and capital letters?		
Are all your references in alphabetical order?		
Are your citations for quotes correctly referenced? For example, (Nunan, 2010, p3)
